Deuteronomy means " a 2nd law ". One way to divide it is to see it as looking in three directions:



Looking back:

God has *never* let us down in the past. This strengthens our faith. God has always forgiven us every time we fell. We don't look back in discouragement or pride but with gratitude for what God has done for us in the past.



Looking upward:



Looking forward:

In Chapter 1: 13 Moses gives advice




It was a 11 day journey from Mt Horeb to

Discernment between what is human and what is Godly is required as well. The ability to discern between Godly and demonic is easy but not so between what is spiritual and what is soulish. We need to discern whether a person is speaking from his head or from his heart. What comes from the head will go to the head of people. Thirdly, experience through crushing in trials and tasting God's power is needed

Moses them warned the judges not to show partiality to the rich. When I was a young believer, every church I went to had an influential person in society, such as a government official or a rich businessman, on its board I wondered why this was so. Surely every big man in the world was not a spiritual man. In fact, the Bible says "God has chosen the poor of the world to be *rich* in **faith** " James 2: 5



In Chapter 2: 2, 3 the Lord told the Israelites they had circled the mountain long enough. Movement is not progress, if we are staying in the same place spiritually. The Lord us calling us now to move on in victory.


Chapter 4: 2 says " You shall not add to the word I am commanding you or take away from it "

Adding to it means, we make rules that are not in Scripture and try to be more spiritual - like Eve who said "we must not *touch* the fruit"




Chapters 4: 24 and 31, we read two statements: " God is a consuming fire " and " God is merciful ". The glory of God was seen in Jesus Christ, full of grace and truth (John 1: 14). God is love and He is holy.




In Chapter 4: 29 Moses said the Israelites could find God if they searched for Him with all their heart and all their soul. Many don't find God because they seek like they would look for a lost 10 paisa coin at night. What if they had misplaced 10000 rupees instead - how long would both the searches take? God is a *rewarder* of the diligent seekers. (Hebrews 11: 6)



In Chapter 5 the Sabbath is commanded to be kept for another reason - to remember that they did *not* get *deliverance* by their own power but through the Lord's strength. Trusting God accomplishes more than busy activity.



In Chapter 5: 29, we read of God's greatest longings for His people. It is rare to find the word " O " in Scripture. Here God uses it saying " O that they had such a heart in them that they would fear Me and keep all My commandments always that it may go well with them and with their sons forever. " His commandments in the Bible are like " Manufacturer's instructions " . Since we are manufactured by God, the Bible has instructions on how to *best* function as human beings. God wants the *best* for us.







We overcome sin not by battling sin primarily but by loving God. This is the expulsive power of a new affection. Like a girl who loses all love for one man when she meets a far better man. The new love drove out the old. When we love God with all our hearts, the love of money, property and evil lusts will thus be driven out. Our intellect and faculties are to be used for God.



When Jesus was tempted, He said " it is written ". He quoted two verses, both from Deuteronomy (6:13 and 8:3). God's word has the answer to every temptation and problem in life.







In Chapter 8: 11-15, Moses warns them: "Beware lest you forget the Lord .. when you have **eaten** and are satisfied and have built good houses, your flocks and herds multiply and your heart becomes proud. " It is easier to think of God when we are in the wilderness, struggling than when we blessed and rich. Noah had no time to get drunk when he was building the ark. But when he came through the flood triumphantly, he did. When David was running from cave to cave, he wrote psalms and was close to God. When he had ease and money, he didn't have to go to battle himself but could send others to do the fighting for him while he *relaxed*. That was when he sinned with Bathsheba Solomon sinned because he had plenty of ease and wealth. When we have plenty we are in danger. Let us be content with what God has decided to give us,








even if it is only a little.





In Chapter 11: 21 Moses told them that God's longing for them was "that your days and the days of your sons maybe multiplied on the land like the days of heaven upon earth." God wants us, even now, to have a foretaste of the joy, peace, love, purity and goodness of heaven in our homes and churches. We can be joyful if we live by the principles of heaven on earth. This is God's will for us. Let us determine to do this throughout, not just at the start of, our Christian lives, looking at Jesus.

Chapter 13 has a section on false prophets. God uses them to test our real desires and longings. They have two methods. The first is to flatter us and tell us we will prosper where we are planning to go - some wealthy country. We will do as they have "prophesied" and thus fulfill their "prophecy" ourselves! This psychological gimmick is called "self-fulfilling prophesy". We are happy because we got what we thought as "God's approval" to go where we wanted and we give the "prophet" a handsome gift. Thus the prophet is happy as well. The devil is also happy because he deceived both us and the prophet. God and the angels of heaven, however, are unhappy. Another trick is to "save" us from non existent danger they "prophesy".



While some foods were unclean for the Israelites, this is *not* applicable to us today since Jesus declared *all* foods clean (Mark 7:19). All food is sanctified when we pray and eat it (1 Timothy 4:1-5)



Chapter 15 speaks of releasing people on the Sabbath year. It also speaks of not being tight-fisted, stingy and hard-hearted, but generous towards their poor brother (verses 7 and 8)

The Lord took a great interest in poor people.




Chapter 17: 14 - 19: It was not God's will for Israel to have a king for He was to be their king. (I Samuel 8: 7) But God always gives people the freedom to choose His second-best if they don't want His best. So He told them that if they chose to have a king, he must read this law everyday, fear God and obey it fully. This is a good reminder for Christian leaders



In Chapter 18: 1-7 Moses forbids spiritism, fortune-telling, divination and witchcraft. (Also in Leviticus 19: 26) Instead of this, the Lord said the would raise up a prophet in the future whom they were to listen to (v 14-19) - a clear reference to the coming of Jesus Christ.







In Chapter 18: 20, they are warned against saying something in the Lord's name which He has not commanded. Many today prophesy saying "Thus says the Lord ... "- to give an air of authority to what they are saying. Then they continue to say whatever is on their minds. Such prophets were to be killed in the Old Testament. God says in Jeremiah 23: 21 " I did not speak to them, yet they prophesied". Yet, multitudes of Christians are lead astray by false prophesies today. We have no right to say "Thus says the Lord "except when quoting something that God has actually said in the Scriptures.

Chapter 28 is divided into two parts. The first 14 verses are promises about how God would bless them if they kept His laws. The next 54 verses are about how God would punish them if they disobeyed His laws. This was the only way God could get man to obey Him under the Old Covenant - by hope of reward and threat of punishment (chocolate and stick approach), a method we use with little children - the promise of a chocolate if they obey and punishment with a stick if they disobey. Under the old covenant, God treated all men like little children. Under the new covenant, God treats us like adults. Jesus said "If you love Me keep my commandments" (John 14: 15) - to obey God out of love and reverence, not out of fear. This is how an adult son obeys his father.
