
THROUGH THE BIBLE



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EXODUS

Exodus deals with the Birth of the nation of Israel. We saw the **beginnings** in Genesis. Now we see it grow into a **full fledged nation**.




In the first chapter of Exodus, we see Pharaoh was *disturbed* by the Israelites who had become numerous and afraid they would rebel.



So he passed an order that all male Israelite children must be killed. Now this scheme originated from the devil. He has always sought to destroy the Jews through history. But , like we saw in Genesis , we see here how God turns the tables on Satan again



If that order had not been passed, Moses' mother would not have put him in a little basket and floated it down the river



But she did so with a prayer to God and Moses was picked up by Pharaoh's daughter and Moses grew up in the palace - the place where God wanted him to be trained in the first 40 years of his life. All this would not have happened if Pharaoh had not passed that evil law. So we see God fulfills His purposes through using Satan's evil work.



So Moses grew up to be a *mighty* military leader, an eloquent *speaker*, a very *rich* man mighty in both word and deed. But the *best* education in the most advanced superpower in the world those days, could not qualify Moses for *God's work*.

All his earthly fame and abilities could not prepare him for God's task. Today many Christians imagine that they can serve God just because they have Bible-knowledge, musical ability and plenty of money. He thought he was ready, but He was not! This is the lesson we learn from the lives of Jacob and Moses. 40 years of the best the world could offer could not prepare Moses for God's service.



God had to take him through *another* 40 years in the wilderness, making him look after his father-in-law's sheep. God *broke* Moses' human strength through this *humbling* experience. At the end of it, this mighty, eloquent man says "I am **unfit**, send somebody else "

Then God said "He was ready"





But when He was in Egypt Moses thought he was ready and tries to deliver the Israelites. He was really strong but imagine how long it would have taken to kill all the millions of Egyptians at that rate! Moses would have died before that. But when God had broken him all Moses had to do was to lift up his rod over the Red Sea and the whole Egyptian army was destroyed. That is the difference between man's own strength and what he can accomplish in God's strength.



This the message from the beginning. You have to be broken to build the church. Now Moses was broken and he thought he was not ready but this is when God called him to fulfil His purposes.



To encourage him. God gave Moses three signs. For the first sign, God told Moses to throw down his staff and it became a snake. This shows us that Satan is closer to us than we think, causing misunderstandings between husband and wife, between co- workers etc. But he is a defeated foe! We need not be afraid of him. We are to run away from temptation (2 Timothy 2.22) but Satan must run away from us! (James 4.7). In Jesus' mighty name, the very thing that Satan uses to frighten will become a rod of authority in our hand. The first thing Moses needed was authority over Satan who actually was enslaving the Israelites through Pharaoh



For the second sign, God asked Moses to put his hand into his bosom, when he took it out it was leprous. God's servants need to understand that nothing good dwells in our flesh (Romans 7.18) If we don't ask God to give us light on our spiritual leprosy of selfishness and corruption, we will go around condemning others, as though they had a flesh worse than ours. Nobody can commit a sin we are incapable of. If we have not done such great sins it is only because of God's mercy.



For the third sign the Lord asked Moses to pour some water from the Nile into the ground and it became blood. The Nile was the precious god of the Egyptians and a symbol of all that the world runs after. We must pour it all out to death. The world is no longer like water to a servant of God, but like blood, that no one would be tempted to drink.




God had one man who He had trained for 80 years, who was absolutely essential for his purposes. Yet God tried to kill him because there was disobedience in His own house. He had not circumcised his son. He needed to lead his home before leading Israel out.

Such was the man who stood before the world's most powerful man. When we stand before God with a clear conscience, what is Pharaoh but dust with breath in his nostrils.



If we don't know God, the only way to survive is to butter earthly authorities to gain favour but Paul said " If I seek to please man, I cannot be a servant of God. God is looking for men who don't care for man's approval, who don't want man's money or backing from any earthly authority. God backs them




Then God confirmed Moses' words with plagues. Some of them were duplicated by the *tricks* of the Egyptian magicians. But their tricks failed after a certain point. Religious people who have a form of godliness without power have always opposed godly men in every age just like Jannes and Jambres opposed Moses.

(2 Timothy 3: 5, 8)



The *religious false* prophets opposed Elijah and Jeremiah. *Pharisees* opposed John the Baptist and Jesus. Throughout church history, professional preachers oppose God's men tooth and nail but God's prophet *does not change* his message to please the professional religious establishment. He will be *vindicated* like Moses in the *end*.

We then read, in chapter 12, about the deliverance of Israel from Egypt. They were told to use a bunch of hyssop and put the blood of an unblemished lamb on the door to escape the angel of death. This is a picture of faith applying the blood of Christ to our hearts. Hyssop was a common plant, easy to find. Faith too, is easy to find.



The Israelites left Egypt on the 14th day of the first month of their new calendar and the Lord Jesus was crucified on the same day around 1500 years later! How were they delivered? Not by their good life or good works. God checked to see if they had the faith to put the blood on the door. When the Israelites dipped the hyssop in blood and put it on their doors they were saying "we do not trust in our good works but in the blood of this innocent lamb.




This is the way of salvation. That night the bad man and the good man who put the blood on their doors were saved If somebody in Israel had thought "I've lived a good life. I don't believe God will judge me " and therefore did not put the blood on the door, what then? The angel of death would have killed his eldest son as well.



After putting the blood on the door, the Israelites were all commanded to eat unleavened bread that night. That is a picture of our feeding on Christ Himself, the Bread of Life. We must trust in this blood but also feed on this Life! We are reconciled to God through this death and saved by this life (Romans 5.10). They were instructed to eat the bread in their travelling clothes - with a readiness to leave Egypt away a moment's notice. That is how we are called to live in this world too - always ready to go, as soon as Jesus calls us up to meet thim. This world is not our home.



While it is *certainly* wrong for **us** to ask for money from unbelievers, it was **right** for **them** because they had worked for the Egyptians for 430 years without getting their wages. Here we see the **righteousness** of **God** that catches up.



When the Israelites reached the Red Sea they discovered they were hemmed in on every side. There was only one direction to look - UP! When we are in tight circumstances like that, deliverance can come to us from only one place - heaven. The Psalmist says in Psalm 121 " I lift up my eyes to the hills. Is my help going to come from there? No. My help comes from the Lord who made heaven and earth. "



The Lord told Moses " Stand still and see the salvation of the Lord which He will accomplish for you. The Lord will fight for you while you keep silent: " (Exodus 14: 13, 14) The Lord split the Sea and the ground was not even wet on which Israelites walked on through This is a picture of baptism in water (1 Corinthians 10.2)



The pillar of *cloud* and *fire* also came down from heaven giving them light and protecting them from their enemies. This is a picture of baptism in the *Holy Spirit* and *fire*. This was the 3-fold experience - redemption by the *blood*, baptism in the water and in the Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit was given to *help* the Israelites conquer the giants and occupy the God-given land of Canaan. Today we need the Holy Spirit to conquer the lusts in our body which belongs to the Lord









Thus after Moses raised his staff, the waters closed back up and the Egyptian army was drowned Psalm 106: 12 says when the Israelites saw the Egyptians dead, THEN they sang God's praises. This is how the man of sight walks. The man of faith says "Lord, you prepare a table in the presence of my enemies". The new covenant Christian praises God in faith, before he sees the answer to his prayer. We are not afraid of the defeated foe, Satan or his agents in the world who may try to harm us.

We read of Israel in the wilderness, in chapter 15 onwards. When they came to the bitter waters of Marah, they began to complain. They had just praised God for delivering them from the Egyptians but now started complaining again. The man of sight complains again and again. The man of faith praises and thanks God.





Exodus 15 begins with the Israelites praising God and ends with them grumbling. This pattern is repeated by them in wilderness. The "sine wave" in mathematics, that goes up and down, is the perfect description of the lives of most believers - praising God when we get what we want, complaining when something goes wrong. We praise God in other tongues on Sunday but complain and grumble in our mother tongue the rest of the week.



Rejoicing in the Lord is His will for us. We can only do that by faith trusting that God has already planned a solution for every problem. The solution to the Israelites' problem too was right there. The Lord had planted a tree perhaps a 100 years earlier! No problem can crop up that surprises God who is silently planning in love for us! (Zephaniah 3:17)



In Chapter 17 we see the Israelites grumble again because they had no water to drink. Moses smites the rock and water begins to flow resulting in many rivers flowing to satisfy the thirsty millions of Israelites. This is a picture of the Spirit-filled life that flows from the "smitten rock", the crucified man, Jesus (John 7:37-39) We must be broken by God to be a blessing




Immediately after the rivers began to flow, Amalek a picture of the *flesh* came. The flesh and the Spirit are in constant conflict. Moses' hands were lifted in prayer to God recognizing his weakness

But when Moses got tired, he needed his hands to be supported by Aaron and Hur. We need our fellow believers. Aaron and Hur were not as gifted as Moses and did not know God as Moses did but he needed them.



One of the great truths in the Christian life is that we cannot make it alone. We need our fellow-believers in the body of Christ. Aaron may have been a leader, but Hur was an unknown man who never appears again in the Scriptures. Let us not despise the weak, unknown members of the body of Christ. Even Jesus asked stumbling Peter, James and John to hold up His hands in Gethsemane. "Even the head (Christ) does not say to the feet (the lowest members in the body) "I don't need you" "(I Corinthians 12.21) So the Aarons and the Hurs are to be immensely valued in the church.




Immediately after giving them the ten commandments, God gave the Israelites a beautiful parable in Chapter 21 to teach them the spirit in which they were to keep the commandments. He speaks of a Hebrew slave who could go free in the seventh year but stays on because he loves his master. He continues to serve, not out of bondage but out of love. Jesus said "If you love Me, keep my commandments" (John 14 . 15)Not a slavish obedience to the letter of the law but joyfully, from the heart, to the spirit of the law





In Exodus 15: 26 God promised them something better than healing if they kept His laws - health This is one reason He gave them many laws on hygiene. Gluttons have themselves to blame if they fall sick due to overeating. There is no difference between a drunkard who dies prematurely due to alcohol addiction and a glutton who dies prematurely due to addiction to good food God's laws can preserve us in health. We wouldn't need to go so often to God for healing if we begin obeying His laws. We will grow old healthy.









When Moses came back to the camp, he set matters straight and led the people back to God. Here he asks "who is on the Lord's side?" to stand with him against sin. The tribe of Levi alone stood with Moses, killing all the leaders of idolatry, not sparing their own relatives. This is the reason why God gave Levites the privilege of being His priests. Even today, God appoints, as His representatives, those who will deal with sin in the church ruthlessly.



Moses had a passion for the person of the Lord and He wanted God Himself to accompany them. Then in 33.18 Moses wishes to see the glory of God. But Moses would only see a bit of that glory, as God hid him in the cleft of the rock. That glory consisted of God's goodness. When that glory comes into our lives, we will do good to both good and evil people.




A large part of Exodus deals with the construction of the tabernacle of God This is first of all a picture of Jesus Himself, the Word become flesh (John 1 14) and his body, the ultimate Jerusalem, the church, the dwelling place of God It is also a picture of each of us who are His children, in whom the Holy Spirit dwells. God was particular that every part of the tabernacle be made to the exact pattern that He have Moses. While Moses had seen the construction of the magnificent pyramids, he did not modify God's simple pattern of the tabernacle to make it more appealing. If he had done so, the tabernacle would have been more impressive but the glory of God would be absent. God's ways are higher than ours. Finally, God must feel at home in our hearts and in the church.



The most holy place was a cube. The heavenly Jerusalem is also a cube symbolizing an equal outer and inner life with no hypocritical spirituality.




The tent of the tabernacle was constructed with cheap wooden boards overlaid with gold a picture of Jesus being both God(gold) and man (wood). It also symbolizes the members of the body of Christ, although human, have been made partakers of the Divine nature (2 Peter 1.4). Each board had two legs that sat in two silver sockets. These sockets speak of the redemptive work of Christ, who was betrayed for silver. Faith and obedience are both required for stability in the desert of this world.



The tent of the tabernacle had 4 coverings. I The innermost - fine linen symbolizing the righteousness of Christ.

- 2 goat's skin symbolizing Christ as the scapegoat, who took our sins.
- 3 rams' skins dyed red symbolizing Jesus , who shed His blood for us.
- 4, The outermost badgers' skins symbolizing the reproach of Christ.




The true beauty of the Christian must be inward not outward.

Outwardly, the church will always be misunderstood and dishonoured. Jesus was despised and rejected by the world Only those who wanted godliness came to Him. People should be drawn to our churches, not by our wordly attractiveness or music, but rather by our godly lives and fellowship. Those who belong to Jesus will go to Him " outside the camp of this world" and " inside the veil " to fellowship with God (Hebrews 13:13 and 10:19,20)

The bronze laver was a large tub for holding water, made from polished brass which was used as a **mirror**.



James 1:23-25 says that God's word is like a mirror. Christ also washes us with the word of God (as we hear and obey it), so that we can serve Him in holiness (Ephesians 526)




The bronze altar of sacrifice had a sloping ramp and no steps going up to it meaning we can go directly to Jesus. The altar was made of wood covered with bronze. When the bronze was hot with the altar fires, the charring of the wood inside could not be seen on the outside. This symbolized the inner sufferings of Christ that no one could see (|Peter 4:1) When we draw near to God, we learn more about these. The greatest of all was the break of fellowship with His Father on the cross which was a suffering far greater than the nails and the crown of thorns





Inside the holy place, towards the northern end, stood the Golden Table of Bread. the Table had 12 loaves on it representing the 12 tribes. This represents Jesus as the Bread of Life by which we are to live. There were 12 seperate loaves because they couldn't become one body in the old covenant. But in the new covenant, we have only one loaf of bread, representing Christ's body at the Lord's table, in which we can all partake, because we are all one body, even though we are from many different backgrounds.





The Golden Lampstand is a picture of Christ as the light of the world and also of us as the light of the world. The priests ensured the lamp was kept burning with oil, symbolizing our responsibility to ensure that our testimony burns bright, by the power of the Holy Spirit. In the old covenant, the lampstand was only one, with seven branches. But in the new covenant, we see in Revelation that each church was represented by a seperate lampstand and that the Lord walks among them, as the head of each seperate lampstand. (Rev 120)

The altar of incense represents prayer in Jesus' name (Revelation 5:8). Prayer is an expression of dependence on God. This incense was to be prepared in a certain proportion only for the Lord and not any man. This means, first of all, we come in the merit of the Lord Jesus alone. It also symbolizes that we must never pray for anything for our own benefit, but for the glory of God alone.



The tabernacle (the outer court, the holy place and the most holy place) was a picture of the body, soul and spirit. When we read the Word of God, it enters our soul (mind and emotions) first. But iF it stops there and does not make us yield our will in obedience to God , then the Word cannot enter our spirit - and we cannot grow spiritually. The veil is our human will which must submit to God's will. Jesus came down " not to do His own will, but the will of His Father who sent Him " (John 6:38)

All His earthly life, Jesus attitude was "not My will, but Yours be done". The veil of His will was torn. We might be stirred in emotion and understand God's will but we will not become spiritual till we give up our will to do God's will. This is the secret of spirituality.



Jesus has now *inaugurated* this new and living way (*not just a door*) for us - so that we can *walk* on it *everyday*. (Hebrews 10:19,20)



The most holy place contained the golden ark of the covenant with the mercy seat as a lid. This is a picture of Christ, the mediator of the new covenant between God and man. 2 golden cherubs were on it. Cherubs also guarded the tree of life in garden of Eden with a flaming sword which fell on Jesus at calvary and on us as well, since we were crucified with Christ. (Galatians 2.20)

Inside the ark, there were three things kept - the 2 tablets of stone with 10 commandments written on them, a golden pot of manna and Aaron's rod that budded. Even though the manna came from heaven, if it was kept overnight, it would stink and breed worms. But this did not happen when placed in the ark!





The symbolism here is this: If God's truth is held only in our minds, it will stink after a while. But if we hold it in humility in God's presence, it will remain fresh perpetually. There is an anointing and freshness when a man who lives in God's presence preaches God's word. The same message, when spoken by another, can be as dry as dead bones. One can have an anointing from heaven and preach powerfully one day. If he loses the anointing the next day, even the very same sermon will be dry and boring. We need to live in God's presence continually.



Aaron's rod was the one that budded when the people questioned the authority of Moses and Aaron. This was kept in the ark as a reminder that God brings resurrection-life out of death, thus bearing witness to His servants. This rod also remained fresh for 40 years, like the manna, reminding us that authority also remains valid only as long as it is exercised in God's presence.





Then we see details regarding the dress of the High Priest, who is a symbol of Jesus, our High Priest. The first layer was a tunic made of fine white linen symbolizing the righteousness of Christ. Over this was a blue robe with pomegranates and bells at the bottom, symbolizing the fruit and gifts of the Spirit. We need both to serve God effectively.

On top of this was a colourful Ephod with the shoulder plates, a 12 stoned breastplate representing the 12 tribes and the "Urim and Thurmim" (exact meaning unknown) which were used to find Gods will, like traffic lights that told the Israelites when to "stop, wait and go "These 3 items symbolized the God's power, love and wisdom in quiding us

But on the day of atonement, once a year, the high priest entered into the most holy place wearing only a *simple* white dress. This symbolizes that when we go before the Lord, we go in simplicity, humility and brokenness. Our holy white dress must be worn before God alone. The tabernacle (outer court, holy place and most holy place) signifies three levels we can live at, in the Christian life. Here are six examples of areas where this is expressed -
