

## NUMBERS


This 4th book of Moses deals with Israel's wanderings and wars in the wilderness.

In chapter 7 we see details of offerings of the leaders. There is a lot of repetition too.



God is a God of order and we can see this by the way the camps of Israelite tribes were placed. He taught this unruly bunch of slaves orderliness and cleanliness. Many believers have no sense of these in their


lives. This affects our spiritual growth.



This shows us that God is interested in each individual. Ten different people might have offered the same offering. But God recorded what each person gave separately. This shows us something of the heart of God. In the world today, it is easy to feel lost as one among millions but God sees each individual as special.



Levi had three sons - Kohath, Gershon and Merari and they were in charge of moving the tabernacle. 6 carts and 12 oxen were given for moving the tabernacle. But these were NOT equally divided. 2 carts and 4 oxen where given to the Gershonites. 4 carts and 8 oxen were given to the Merarites. The Kohathites were to carry the ark on their shoulders. Let us not covet and question God regarding what others have. The all-wise God does everything perfectly.



The most sacred job of moving the tabernacle was given to the sons of Levi. We learn that we cannot take God's commandments lightly. In David's time, Uzzah touched the ark because he thought it was falling. He was not a Levite. God killed him for this. If God has not given us responsibility in the church, we should not touch it. We must learn to mind our own business.



In Numbers 5:2 we read that lepers were
to be put outside the camp. Although
Exodus 15:26 says "I am the Lord, your
Healer" there were sick Israelites that
were not healed. Although God could have
healed them, he didn't. We cannot lock God
in a box saying He heals all who have faith



Restitution was to have an added 20% to the original sum for a year old debt. This is why Zaccheus, who was a shrewd accountant, calculated that if 20% was for a year's debt, over 300% would have to be added for eight year old debts, at compound interest. This is why he returned 4 times what he had wrongly taken from people. The Lord allowed him to do this because it was righteous.





In chapter 5: II - 31 we read of how God exposes sin in an unfaithful wife. We read about how God exposed adultery in a woman by making her drink water that contained some of the dust of the floor of the tabernacle. The secret sin would be revealed by seeing whether her belly was swelling and her thigh rotting. In the early church, the secret sin of Ananias and Saphira was exposed by the Holy Spirit, not "holy water". Peter exposed Ananias and Saphira supernaturally through the discernment of the Holy Spirit. It is very important for spiritual leaders to have discernment through the Holy Spirit so they can see the true spiritual condition of people.



Numbers 6:1 - 21 deals with the Nazirite vow.
They were not to cut their hair or drink grape- juice or wine.
Samson was Nazirite.
His strength was in his dedication. Jesus, however was not a Nazirite. He was called a Nazarene because he lived in Nazareth



In chapter 6 we see the blessing that Aaron gives the people. It was not one of health and wealth. It was far more.

" May He preserve you from all evil.

May His glory shine upon you.

May He be merciful to you.

May you have peace in heart, home and life"



In chapter 9 we read about how the Lord lead His people by a pillar of cloud and fire. When the cloud moved, they set out. When the cloud stopped, they stopped. Sometimes the cloud lingered for a few days, sometimes for months. Imagine the inconvenience of this! They would have just set up camp in the evening and then at dawn they had to move! They had to learn patience and learn to obey God moment by moment. A true servant of God will never complain when God tells him to do something inconvenient:





The pillar is a picture of the Holy Spirit. We can be born of the Spirit but only those who are " led by the Spirit" are sons of God. (Romans 8.14) There is a difference between a child and a mature son




In chapter I and 2 we see the grumbling of the leaders. Miriam and Aaron criticised Moses and were jealous of his ministry. They saw God using their younger brother as Israel's prophet leader. Moses was the humblest man on earth. The Lord heard the grumbling against Moses. The Lord affirmed that He spoke to Moses face to face, not in visions and dreams. To hear the Lord speaking to our hearts through His Spirit is far more superior to visions. The Lord was angry with Miriam and Aaron for criticising his anointed servant.




Miriam was struck with leprosy and Moses, whom she criticized, had to pray for her.

We are called to "pray for those who persecute us " (Matthew 5.44). Moses did this.



In chapter 13, the Israelites came to Kadesh-barnea at the border of Canaan - the land that God had promised them. It was now 2 years since they left Egypt. They sent 12 spies to survey the land. All said it was a wonderful land. 10 however said " there are huge giants there and we cannot conquer them ". Caleb and Joshua replied differently ..



Joshua and Caleb said " the Lord will help us conquer those giants ". But the 600,000 Israelites listened to the majority. Jesus said " the way to life is narrow and very few find it " It is dangerous to follow the majority because invariably they are wrong and are on the broad way to destruction Jesus' church had only 11 members in it! God was on the side of the 2 here and not the 10. But the Israelites foolishly followed the majority and they had to wander in the wilderness for the *next 38 years*! Christendom in general is full of compromise and worldliness. Here and there, God raises a few who stand for the truth of God's word without any compromise. God with one man is a majority against any number of people.



We recognize a man with whom God is standing with by the language of faith he speaks. " We can overcome the giants of anger, sexual lust, jealousy, murmuring and the love of money. God will crush Satan under our feet. This is faith



Sadly, many Christians go astray exactly like the Israelites - through human reasoning. God has hidden these truths from the clever and intelligent and revealed them to babes. What we need is the revelation of the Holy Spirit



In chapter 16 we read of the **rebellion** of **Korah** and his fellow-rebels. They did **not learn** from the **mistake** of Miriam. Wise men learn from the mistakes of **others**.



Initially we read of Korah, Dathan, Abiram and On rebelling. Overnight, one of the men, On, came to his senses. The sons of Korah pulled back from their dad and stood with Moses. Sometimes the children have more sense than the parents. Thus the sons of Korah did not die. In Psalm 84:10 they wrote "I would rather be a doorkeeper in the house of God than dwell in the tents of wickedness"



Foolish men make the same mistakes that others make. We read of two men who went to heaven alive - Enoch and Elijah. Here we read the rebels went alive to hell! Moses called Dathan and Abiram to warn them privately but they refused to meet him. Their pride and arrogance in refusing to meet Moses sealed their fate and the fate of their families. The next morning these three men came to Moses with no change in their attitude and they were punished



God now wanted to prove to the Israelites that it was He Himself Who had appointed Aaron to be the high priest.

The Lord identifies His servants by the principle of resurrection



We find a lovely verse in Chapter 18:20, where the Lord tells Aaron, "You shall have no inheritance in the promised land. I am your portion and your inheritance."

There is nothing wrong with owning a house, lands, cars or whatever but we are not attached to them.





In Chapter 20, we read of, the otherwise faithful, Moses being punished for one act of disobedience. This was the second time the people cried for water. This time the Lord told Moses to speak to the rock, not smite it. Moses was angry and struck the rock and was not allowed to enter Canaan




God expects more from leaders, than from ordinary believers. To whom more is given, more is required. Although Moses pleaded with God, He would not relent. Whenever Moses prayed for others, God relented But not when he prayed for himself. God was good to him ... 1500 years later, God allowed him to enter the promised land, when he stood with our Lord Jesus on the mount of transfiguration!

That was the first time he stood in the promised land. God honoured His servant by giving him a much better entry into Canaan than if he had entered with the rebellious Israelites. God is always " silently planning for us in love ". But at that time, God had to punish Moses publicly so that the people would know that God is strict with disobedience in His servants.



But did the water *flow* when Moses disobeyed? Yes, it did Even when a man disobeys God, the blessings may still flow from his ministry. It proves that God loves the people. It does not prove that God is happy with such a man who is carnal and disobedient.





In Chapter 21, we read of the poisonous snakes. When the people cried out, God told Moses to make a bronze figure of a serpent and put it on the pole. Anyone who was bitten could look at it and be healed. This was a picture of the cross where Jesus would be lifted up to die. The old serpent Satan has bitten us all and if we look at Jesus we can be healed - forgiven and set free permanently!





In Chapters 22-24 we read King Balak invited Balaam to curse Israel



Balaam sought the will of God and God clearly told Balaam not to go. But then King Balak said he would give him more honour and more money if he cursed Israel. Then Balaam sought God's will a second time. There was no need for this. But he was eager to get the money.



But God doesn't change his mind regarding His decision.. even if money and honour are more attractive to us. Let us remember Balaam when we face similar situations.

Nevertheless, the Lord saw Balaam wanted to go so He said "Go" but God sent an angel to stop him. The donkey saw the angel when the spiritually blind prophet could not! This was because he loved money whereas the donkey did not!

Although Balaam was once a prophet he lost the anointing.



This was the first instance of speaking in tongues - a donkey speaking a foreign language fluently! But speaking in tongues did not make the donkey spiritual... Now Balaam suggested a clever tactic to Balak of Moab. The best way to destroy the Israelites was by making God turn against them - through immorality. So he asked them to send their pretty women into the Israeli camp. Thus Israel fell into immorality and also started worshipping the idols of the Moabite girls. Sure enough, God punished them severely.

24,000 people died of a plague. Satan has polluted believers in the same way today! Let us learn from Satan's schemes



As the plague spread, the Israelites would have been wiped out as a nation but for the zeal of one man.

Phinehas. He killed both the man and Midianite woman who he was with in the tent. Then the plague stopped God honours those who stand boldly for him against others even though it is unpopular



In chapter 26, we read of the second census. We see here the persistence of God in bringing them back to Kadesh-Barnea and giving them a second chance to enter the promised land. This is a great encouragement to those who have failed. He is the God of the millionth chance! He forgives us again and again and gives us any number of chances to enter a life of victory.

In chapter 28 and 29 are some more laws about offerings.

Chapter 30 concerns vows. A father can cancel a vow that his daughter foolishly makes and a husband can cancel a foolish vow his wife makes. It is important for fathers and husbands to prevent their children from going astray and to be the head of the home



When Moses chose the next leader of Israel, he did not choose his sons. He was a man of God and was not interested in starting a dynasty. He sought God's will and God told him to appoint Joshua. " a man in whom is the Spirit" (verse 18), as the next leader of Israel



In Chapter 32, we read of the compromise of the tribes of Reuben and Gad. They were enormously wealthy in cattle and needed pastures. They found the land of Gilead on the eastern side of Jordan ( not within Canaan ) and wanted to settle there. Even after 40 years of wandering they rejected the call of God to enter Canaan. What does God do with people who are more interested in their business and wealth than a life of victory? He lets them go their way
